The Operational Plan for 2018/19 which was approved by the Board provides specific focus on plans for quality, underpinned by the Patient Care Improvement Programme and assured via the Care Excellence Framework. In addition, the 2025Vision sets out our key objectives, including the provision of safe, effective, caring and responsive services. This strategic objective is measured via a number of critical success factors covering CQC ratings, reductions in harm arising from falls and pressure ulcers, maintaining mortality rates, infection control measures and PLACE inspection performance. We have a robust Quality Impact Assessment process in place which provides assurance that the quality of care is not compromised for any financial planning decisions taken. The Annual Business Cycles for the Trust Board and the Quality Assurance Committee provide a framework for reporting on all aspects of quality and this includes regular Patient Experience Reports and our Annual Quality Account, which demonstrate the mechanisms by which information from stakeholders and patients on the quality of our services, is taken into account. 
