I am writing to acknowledge receipt of your email dated 22nd November 2024 sent to our communications team, requesting information under the Freedom of Information Act (2000): Slips or Falls on Ice.

We apologise for the delay.

On 22nd November 2024 we contacted you via email as we required the following clarification. To continue with your request we require clarification on the following:

The codes you mention seem to be Clinical Codes and we're not sure what incidents you are referring to. Do you mean accidents that generate a Datix i.e. persons are injured on Trust Estate or where our employees are injured off site during the course of their duties and where the Datix captures the various causes and types of surfaces or elevation etc and if so, are you only referring to persons who are injured and attend treatment thereby generating various clinical Codes?

Or are you requesting data relating to patients who presented to UHNM for treatment which could have occurred anywhere including out and about down the high street or at home?

On 25th November 2024 you replied via email with:

'I am requesting data relating to patients who presented to UHNM for treatment which could have occurred anywhere including out and about down the high street or at home.'

Q1 Under the Freedom of Information Act 2000, I kindly request the following information regarding incidents and admissions related to slipping or falling on snow or ice.

- A1 For AE attendances we do not record how the injury occurred on our current clinical information system. This would require a manual review of the AE attendances to try and ascertain the cause of the injury.

The Trust's Clinical Coding Team have advised we use the following ICD10 coding to identify falls involving ice / snow – W00, with the 4th character showing where the incident happened, for inpatient stays. For the time period 01/01/21 - 31/10/24 there were 237 inpatient stays who had the above ICD10 clinical coding applied to their record.

Section 12 exemption applies as detailed below:

I can neither confirm nor deny whether the information you have requested is held by the Trust in its entirety. This is because the information requested in this question is not held centrally but may be recorded in health records (237 patient records). In order to confirm whether this information is held we would therefore have to individually access all health records within the Trust and extract the information where it is present. We therefore estimate that complying with your request is exempt under section 12 of the FOI Act: *cost of compliance is excessive*. The section 12 exemption applies when it is estimated a request will take in excess of 18 hours to complete. We estimate that accessing and reviewing all health records and then extracting relevant information would take longer than the 18 hours allowed for. In addition to the section 12 exemption the Trust is also applying section 14 (1) exemption: *oppressive burden on the authority*

A2 Some information within this request has not been given due to the low numbers. We have therefore provided age bands. This is because it is exempt under section 40(2) of the FOI Act: *personal information.* The information could be used to identify individual patients and therefore has not been released. *This exemption is an absolute exemption and therefore no consideration of the public interest test is needed.*
