I am writing to acknowledge receipt of your email dated 4th December 2023 requesting information under the Freedom of Information Act (2000) regarding homeless admissions to ED

On 5<sup>th</sup> December we contacted you via email as we required a timeframe in order to collate the information

On the same day you replied via email with:

'I am a third year adult student nurse at Keele university and I am required to develop a hypothetical business case report for additional nursing care funding.

My idea is to introduce a homeless link nurses into Emergency Department (ED) who could then liaise with the appropriate agencies, for help & ongoing support, when a homeless person presents in ED.

I am requesting the following information since 2019'

As of 1<sup>st</sup> November 2014 University Hospitals of North Midlands NHS Trust (UHNM) manages two hospital sites – Royal Stoke University Hospital, and County Hospital (Stafford). Therefore the response below is for the two sites combined from that date where appropriate.

## Q1 How many homeless people present at the emergency department (ED)?

A1 We do not refer to patients as homeless, we refer to them as no fixed abode, this will include patients who are "sofa surfing", YMCA, hostels and living on the streets. To identify this cohort of patient we use the post code of ZZ99 3VZ. https://www.datadictionary.nhs.uk/data\_elements/postcode.html#ariaid-title2

For the period 2019 to date (07/01/2024) there were 944 unique patients where the postcode was ZZ99 3VZ, this equated to 2391 ED admissions.

## Q2 Is there a Link nurse within the hospital or in ED?

A2 Yes, Royal, there is a Homelessness Lead Nurse County – Yes, there is a Homelessness Lead Nurse







- Q3 What is the costing of treating a homeless person when they present. What are the ongoing costs?
- A3 None
- Q4 What is the reason why a homeless persons presents? Is it drug, alcohol reasons or others as well
- A4 We do not record the reason why a person attends we only record the diagnoses made during the attendance, the below table shows the top 10 diagnosis identified during attendance:-

The data is based on the 2391 attendances and not the unique patients as the conditions identified during the attendance could be different for each attendance.
